My friend Wilks has handed me your letter in answer to one he sent you on Friday. — The young man referred to is my youngest brother, Henry Dymond, returned not many months since from the United States after seeing some sharp fighting in the federal army. — He is able to take a shorthand, write and transcribe in a good hand, well up in current events very warmly attached to the Northern Cause and in

he would suit you well &  
I should be truly glad to see  
him in such a position. —

My friend Mr. Hoe knows  
all about his leaving the  
army and that he did so  
under circumstances reflecting  
no discredit on himself. —

own hands. — He is just  
now travelling in the  
West of England, & I do not  
know precisely where a letter  
will find him but he will

with you in a few days. -
